
Some of the world's greatest performers will be coming to Blackwood in the next few months, making this 2017 season one of the most exciting in BTOS history.

# **GLEDHILL RETURNS FOR MAKE-A-WISH**

**SIMON GLEDHILL** was at Blackwood in 2004; but because of the huge demand for his talent in the U.S., it has taken over a decade to schedule his return concerts on July 9. Like other British performers who have captured America with their genius, Gledhill is known throughout the world for his excellent techniques and beautiful interpretations of popular and light music on the theater organ.

Since winning his first competition at 17, Simon has been a favorite BBC recording and broadcast artist. He has toured Germany, Holland, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada, and has performed at all major theater organ venues in Great Britain and the United States, where he has been featured at numerous American Theatre Organ Society conventions and in 1997 was honored as ATOS Organist of the Year.

Gledhill's music has won high praise from his peers. Lyn Larson said, "He is that rare combination of flawless technique, impeccable phrasing and an unerring sense of



In addition to his concert and recording activities, and working with Britain's Cinema Organ Society, Simon has a full-time career in corporate banking, based in London.

The July 9 concert will benefit children from the north Butler area who have been referred to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. There will be two performances, one at 2:00 p.m. and the other at 4:30 p.m., with refreshments between.



On August 13, when **RON BICKEL** brings the **Merrymakers Jazz Trio** to Blackwood, the music room will be filled with a cross-section of lively traditional jazz—Dixieland, Big Band, and more contemporary styles—and the audience will be captivated by Benny Goodman hits, Sinatra's "My Way," and Glenn Miller's "In the Mood."



Ron Bickel, leader of the Trio, holds a B.S. and M.M. degree in Piano/Jazz from Duquesne University, and is a professor of Jazz Piano at Duquesne's School of Music. He has performed with many notable jazz artists, including Mel Torme, The Skyliners, Billy Eckstine, Glenn Miller and Jimmy Dorsey bands, Little Anthony and the Imperials, The Modernaires, and Bobby Vinton. He has performed at all of the big venues in Pittsburgh as well as on the radio, television, and movies, and with his own group at notable Jazz Festivals in Pennsylvania. Ron is a composer and arranger, and author of *The Complete Jazz Pianist* and *Developing Relative Pitch*, which are used at Duquesne and throughout the world.

Filling out the Trio will be saxophone/clarinet player **TONY GALLO**, who has performed with the Pittsburgh Symphony and the Civic Light Opera Orchestras, and drummer **GARY NOAH**, former Band Director at Chartiers-Houston High School.

The Merrymakers Jazz Trio was awarded "Best of 2016" by Gig Masters. Their Blackwood concert will be five stars, for the performers are first class. They have been together for more than 19 years, they know jazz thoroughly, and they instinctively play the music as it was meant to be communicated. Reviewers say, "While people who love jazz love this group; even better, people who don't love jazz are also very enthusiastic—their music is infectious."


### **WICKERHAM BRINGS LIFE TO "THE GENERAL"**

If you chased the New York streets with Babe Ruth and **Dave Wickerham** in "Speedy," you can imagine what Wickerham will do with **Buster Keaton's** silent film "**The General**." In the intimate setting of the Blackwood music room, Wickerham will take the famous locomotive chase to infinity. He is THAT GOOD! "The General" has been ranked by the American Film Institute as **one of the greatest American films ever made**, and voted one of the **10 greatest films of all time** in a *Sight & Sound* poll. But the rank won't matter because for you, the performance at Blackwood will be unforgettable.

The film, a historical parody set during the Civil War, is based on William Pittenger's book "The Great Locomotive Chase." Pittenger was the engineer involved in the actual chase. His history is from the North's vantage point, whereas Keaton's is from the South's, involving a Confederate locomotive (called *The General*) hijacked by



Union spies. Reviewer Gary Giddins recently described the locomotive pursuit as "relentless as any Bourne blowout." He also said, "Keaton's comedic understatement makes 'The General' a surprisingly modern experience. The storytelling and the gags are free of sentimentality and knockabout clichés and the four-minute battle scene is simply one of the most gripping, and occasionally hilarious, ever filmed."



"The General" was one of the most expensive films of its time--\$750,000 [\$10,146,147 today], according to Joseph Schenck, co-producer. To generate an accurate historical re-creation of the Civil War episode, Keaton had 3,000 people on its payroll, and faced hundreds of extras in the building of real bridges and dams, and an actual locomotive falling from a burning bridge into a gorge far below. (Fans still take pilgrimages to the site where this scene was filmed to view objects that remain.)

When released in early 1927, "The General" was poorly received, and its failure to return a significant profit cost Keaton his independence as a filmmaker. Regardless, in 1963 Keaton said, "I was more proud of that picture than any I ever made, because I took an actual happening out of the history books, and I told the story in detail." Audiences and critics later agreed with its worth, for it is now considered a major classic. In 1989 (the first year the Library of Congress, U.S. National Film Registry was enacted), "The General" was selected for

preservation as being culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant--along with such films as "Gone with the Wind," "Star Wars Episode IV," and "The Wizard of Oz."

The film was released on Blu-Ray in February 2017. In the coinciding issue of *Filmmaker Magazine*, Sidney Lumet wrote, "For all the imitations and all the advances in technology, 'The General' is as thrilling as it ever was—maybe more so, since Keaton's life-risking stunts and spectacular pyrotechnics provide a visceral ecstasy no digital effects can possibly replicate." It must be remembered that Keaton never used a double, even for very dangerous scenes. Keaton grew up in a vaudeville family. As part of the act, he was thrown around the stage, learning his physical skills in a painful childhood apprenticeship.

### NORDWALL CONNECTS WITH ALL

**JONAS NORDWALL**, the "grandee of the organ arts," one of the most respected organists in the world, will be back for the scholarship dinner-concert on October 8. His theme will be "The Theater Organ in the 21st Century."

Nordwall is a brilliant organist, skilled in all types of music. He grew up in the days when Elvis Presley was "king"; but Jonas was drawn to the pipe organ, instead of the electric guitar, because of its powerful bass. He loves the theater pipe organ! It has consumed both his professional and personal life, and his enthusiasm connects with all who are privileged to hear him play. During a concert, he will bring out the best the instrument can give, from the timbres of an inspiring hymn or patriotic cry, to the tender tones of a love song, or the spirited beat of "Stayin' Alive." All he wants is for people to enjoy his music. Jonas has over 30 highly-acclaimed recordings which are heard on the syndicated radio show "Pipedreams."




At 16, Jonas performed before Sweden's King Gustav Adolf. Since then, he has captured audiences in China, Japan, Switzerland, the U.K., New Zealand, and Australia. He had long runs at the lavish Organ Grinder restaurants in Portland and Denver, has solo appearances with Symphony Orchestras in Oregon, Washington, Vancouver, and the Silicon Valley, and is a regular for American Guild of Organist and American Theatre Organ Society conventions. He is the principal coordinator for the ATOS Youth and Adult Educational Theater Organ Summer Camp Program.

In addition to his performing career, Nordwall has been a major influence in the design and manufacture of both pipe and electronic organs, working over 30 years with the Rodgers Organ Company and, presently, with the Allen Organ Company. A few years ago, Jonas was honored for his long tenure as organist with the First United Methodist Church in Portland and for his redesign and oversight of the \$500,000 rebuilding project for its 7,400-pipe organ.

volunteered to Chair the Scholarship Committee! Katerina, an international viola/violin performer and educator, is very passionate about education and music. She was principal viola of the Julliard Orchestra and the New World Symphony and has toured throughout North and South America, Europe, and Asia. Recognized for her powerful effect on young musicians, she has worked as a fellow with the Music Advancement and Gluck Committee Service programs with the Julliard School, and as a teaching artist in Colombia and the New World Symphony. She earned her Bachelor of Music in Viola Performance from Julliard, and her Master of Music from the Universite de Montreal and the Hochschule fur Musik und Darstellende Kunst in Vienna, Austria. Two years ago, she received a Master of Science in Professional Counseling from Carlow University.


